1. Matters arising

Sophie (Entz): Big thing we've got our first book of the year coming up on Saturday, it's in college, which means we have to go by college times not like normal nightlife times. So it starts at nine but that shouldn't be an issue for any of the freshers because you will be drunk by like, one 1pm.

3. Motions

a. Funding sanitary products in Teddy

The JCR notes that:

- Some people get periods.
- Periods can be not fun.
- Having an expensive period is even more not fun.
- Sanitary products (even though they are an essential product) are expensive.
- Period poverty is a widespread issue:

- 1 in 10 girls between ages 14-21 were found to have been unable to afford sanitary products at some point (Plan International UK, 2017).
- 1 in 5 girls have changed to “less suitable” sanitary products due to cost (Plan International UK, 2017).
- Teddy Hall previously only provided sanitary products in the welfare room (dealt with by the women and minority gender identity officers) and the library bathroom (dealt with by the librarians).
- The sanitary products Teddy Hall have previously provided have been through Grace & Green, a sustainable business which produces quality, natural products and which we have previously got a discount from.
- The previous Women and minority gender identity officers asked the JCR for a £100 a term to spend at Grace and Green
 - This money went to the products in the welfare room which people could pick up
- We have contacted college (via Brit) to ask for the money out of the domestic fund
 - This has not yet been approved

The JCR believes that:

- Everyone should have access to sanitary products easily and affordably
- Sanitary products are an essential, yet sometimes unaffordable monthly expense for many students
- The sanitary products we provide should be eco-friendly
- The sanitary products we provide should be easily accessible around the whole college site

- It should not necessarily be the JCR’s responsibility to provide them around the college site, as everyone has access to them

The JCR resolves to:

- Provide £220 to the Women and minority gender identity officers to purchase sanitary products from Grace & Green in preparation for Michaelmas term
 - Will provide 20 regular pads and tampons for every bathroom stall
 - 10 of every other product (light, regular, heavy) for the welfare room stock
- Make these products available in all public bathroom stalls across college (Male, Female, and gender-neutral bathrooms)
- Have a sufficient supply in the welfare room
- Ask Brit to talk to college again and sort out this expense coming out of the domestic fund in the future
- Monitor usage and come back in Hilary term with a revised budget to supply the perfect amounts

P: Okay, so JCR notes some people get periods periods are not fun, have an expensive period is even more not fun, sanitary products even though they are essential products are expensive. There's some shocking stats, such as one in five girls changing to less sustainable sanitary products due to the cost. Previously, we only provided sanitary products in the welfare room. And what Sarah is proposing is that everyone should have access to free sanitary products, with these being eco friendly and placed in all toilets in college. So the JCR

resolves to provide 220 pounds for the women and minority gender identity officers to purchase sanitary products from Grace and Green. That's 20 Regular pads and tampons for every bathroom stall, and 10 of every other product, such as like regular and heavy flow for the welfare room stock. These are going to be available in all bathrooms. There should be a sufficient supply in the welfare room and ask Brit to talk to college and sought out this expense coming out the domestic fund in the future and then monitor usage and come back in Hillary with a revised budget to supply the perfect amount.

Q: Is this going to be a one-off cost?

A: no it's not going to be a one off so it's going to be a regular payment but this is a one off cost of purchase before monitoring to see how much we will actually need. And in future I think the plan is for it to go out the college fund.

b. Funding play “Conversations”

The JCR notes that:

- A student production of a new play, ‘Conversations’ is to be staged in Oxford at the Burton Taylor Studio in 3rd week.
- The production company, Orange Script Productions, was founded by Teddy Hall students.

- The play is written by Will Heath, last year’s Teddy Creative Writing co-pres, and explores LGBTQ narratives, relationships and relatable university life experiences, so should appeal to a student audience!
- The play’s crew consists largely of Teddy Hall students, including its director, co-producers, associate producer and the lighting designer.

The JCR believes that:

- Funding the play would greatly help in allowing an outlet for Teddy Hall students to explore their passions for theatre and drama and ensure such an opportunity goes ahead.
- Teddy Hall has a strong track record of supporting the arts, such as granting £250 to 2nd May, 1997 in MT21 (another Teddy Hall-led student drama project), to Persephone, £300 to Tick, Tick... Boom in TT22, and £300 to Orange Script’s last production, ‘Checking Out’ in TT21.
- The college should strive to keep their active presence in the student drama scene, continuing to offer diverse, all-round opportunities at the Hall through the arts, and have a reputation for supporting students across all extracurricular activities.
- The Oxford Drama Society mainly functions on JCRs across Oxford giving financial backings to plays. This funding covers fixed costs such as venue hire of the Burton Taylor Studio.

The JCR resolves to:

- Donate £300 to the production, which would allow the crew to pay the hire costs for set, pay for marketing materials, as well as providing funds for costume, make-up and props.

A: It's something like "what's love for you?" And they're like "Pizza".

A: So you've got a gay man in a chair. He's like, "Okay, what is love?" And he's like, "I don't know what does everyone else say?" And they're like, "Shut up. Please tell me about your life" and it goes from like baby to old man.

Food provision at JCR meetings should continue at least at precedent levels

The JCR resolves to:

Increase the weekly JCR budget for food for meetings to £120

P: This is just a quick one for me. We have a huge turnout here. Monstrous 46 on counting and more since the meeting started. And what we can't do in this day and age is reduce our pizza consumption in JCR meetings. But however, it's been a tough tough summer for

cost of living, Domino's is no exception. So I'm asking to raise the price budget for food for JCR meetings from 100 quid to 120 quid.

Q: What's your favourite flavour of pizza?

A: If it's from Domino's, I would have to say either the meaty or the absolute banger. Both very solid pizza toppings.

Q: I think 20 pounds is quite a measly increase in the budget, and we should have far more money.

A: I think 20 pounds is a generous addition that will allow me to actually get an extra pizza, as opposed to the number that we normally have. It might not be a large, but it will be an extra pizza. And given the turnout, I think that's a sensible increase. I wouldn't want to go too crazy at this stage.

The JCR notes that:

- Drink spiking is a serious and dangerous issue

- It should not have to be on you to ensure this does not happen
- "Girls night in" occurred last year but meaningful action does not appear to have followed
- We cannot remain unsafe in this way until the wider actions and social change that are needed to ensure safety are taken
- Cup covers are a useful tool to ensure that you feel safe on a night out
- 100 drinks covers with my cup condom will be around £162
- 100 drinks covers with DrinkSafe will be around £30

The JCR believes that:

- Everyone should feel safe on a night out
- The JCR should support its students in feeling safe
- Cup covers should be freely available
- Everyone should feel safe getting a drink and not be worried it has been tampered with
- Drinks covers should be made available, free of charge and of easy access, to all students at Teddy Hall
- If it is appropriate, we might be able to find sustainable drinks covers

The JCR resolves to:

- Give the women and minority gender identity officers £x to spend with either my cup condom or DrinkSafe to put in an initial order of drinks covers
- Talk to Hayley to make these available in the bar

- Talk to the porters so they are available at the porters lodge
- Place them in the welfare room
- Put them in pidges (upon request)
- Revisit this issue when we see how quickly they get used to discuss potentially making this a repeat order
- With support, email Bridge, Atik, Glamorous and any other venues we can think of to ask why they do not provide them and recommend this changes immediately

P: Drink spiking is a serious and dangerous issue. It should not have to be on you to ensure this does not happen. Girls Night In occurred last year, but meaningful action does not appear to have followed. We cannot remain unsafe in this way until wider action and social changes that are needed to ensure safety are taken. Cup covers are a useful tool to ensure that you feel safe on a night out 100 drink cup covers with My Cup Condom will be around 162 pounds and 100 drink covers with Drink Safe will be around 30 pounds. JCR results to give the women and minority gender identity officers X pound to spend with either My Cup Condom or Drink Safe to put an initial order of drink covers. They want to talk to Haley about how to make these available in the bar. Talk to Porter so they're available at the plodge, put them in pidges upon request, put them in the welfare room and revisit the issue when we see how quickly they get used to discuss potentially making this a repeat order. They also want to email bridge, atik,

glamorous and any other venues we can think of to ask why they do not provide them and recommend that this changes immediately.

Q: Can I asked whether this is like out of the JCR budget or for Brit to talk to big committee about?

A: We can assume it's the same as the motion for sanitary products.

Q: I thought we had drinks covers already, or have they run out?

POI: A roll of 500 was purchased for freshers week, there are about 150 left. These are the sticker ones (Drink Safe). We are also thinking about more sustainable options, such as the My Cup Condom ones.

Friendly amendment accepted to put the order for drink covers mostly towards the more sustainable option.

Q: Are there more than 100 women in the hall? Should we get enough for everyone? Or is this something that like one person has and then they keep it or like you have it and then you give it back?

A: So I think it's an initial order to see how many people want to use them. And then if there is an excess or increase in demand I think that will be sorted out.

POI: The reusable ones would be one per person and so you would get one and hopefully not lose it on a night out. But the stickers are cheaper but slightly less sustainable, but that's why we've got more

than 100 of them so you can grab them in the welfare room, they're by all the other sexual health stuff on the windowsill and outside the welfare room.
